STATE OF ARIZONA PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, from 2019-2021, Arizona recorded more than 100,000 injury/fatal traffic-related crashes, placing thousands of on-scene first responders (EMS/fire, law enforcement, transportation/public works, 911 communications, towing/recovery) at risk of being struck-by and killed or injured by approaching/passing motorists; and

WHEREAS, "D" Drivers (drunk, drugged, drowsy, distracted, and otherwise dangerous drivers) present the greatest risk for secondary crashes and on-scene first responders being struck and killed or injured; and

WHEREAS, Traffic Incident Management (TIM) is the planned and coordinated multi-disciplinary process to detect, respond to, and safely clear traffic incidents quickly to improve the safety of motorists, crash victims and emergency responders; and

WHEREAS, the Federal Highway Administration's TIM course is a free four-hour class that trains first responders to work highway scenes under a unified command structure to facilitate responder safety, safe and quick roadway clearance, and interoperable communication; and

WHEREAS, Arizona completed 438 TIM training sessions, resulting in 8,743 crash first responders being trained (2,677 law enforcement, 1,890 fire-rescue, 1,550 towing and recovery, 362 emergency medical services, 1,818 transportation/public works, and 446 other disciplines) as of August 29, 2022; and

WHEREAS, this year's theme is "See Flashing Lights Ahead? Slow Down or Move Over."; and

WHEREAS, first responders are encouraged to complete the free hour-hour TIM course by registering on the AZ TIM website.

WHEREAS, according to the Michigan State Police Office of Highway Safety Planning, a traffic crash was reported in Michigan every 1 minute and 52 seconds resulting in 282,640 traffic crashes in 2021, and emergency vehicles were involved in 2,379 of these crashes including two fatal crashes and 356 injury crashes; and,

WHEREAS, emergency responders working the scene of a traffic crash or other incident may include any combination of law enforcement officers, firefighters, emergency medical service personnel, towing and recovery operators, and transportation first responders, and they risk being struck by a vehicle and killed or injured in the line of duty every hour of every day; and,

WHEREAS, according to the Emergency Responder Safety Institute, nationwide 36 emergency responders have been struck and killed while responding to traffic incidents since January 2022, and in 2021, 65 emergency responders nationwide, which is an increase of more than 40% compared to 2020, were struck and killed while responding to traffic incidents; and,

WHEREAS, all emergency responders have a responsibility to protect each other along with the motoring public and reduce the risk of secondary crashes by training in traffic incident management (TIM) with other emergency responders and using TIM best practices when responding to traffic incidents; and,

WHEREAS, all motorists have a responsibility to drive safely around traffic incidents and reduce the risk of secondary crashes by following Michigan laws that increase emergency responder and motorist safety; and,

WHEREAS, Michigan's Move Over law requires drivers approaching stopped emergency vehicles with emergency lights activated to slow down at least 10 mph below the posted speed limit, and move over at least one lane if safely possible; and,

WHEREAS, Crash Responder Safety Week is an opportunity for Michigan to raise awareness that every emergency responder and every driver has a responsibility for traffic incident scene safety, and by staying alert, avoiding distractions, driving safely around traffic incidents and obeying the Move Over law, we can save lives;

WHEREAS, Crash Responder Safety Week is a nationally recognized initiative to bring awareness to and educate motorists about responder safety during traffic incidents and the importance of abiding by established Slow Down, Move Over laws that protect first responders and motorists during crashes; and

WHEREAS, in New Jersey a driver who fails to slow down or move over for law enforcement officers, firefighters, emergency medical personnel, public service utility workers, transportation road crews, and tow operators that have emergency lights on is subject to a fine between \$100 and \$500; and

WHEREAS, the State of New Jersey strengthened the Slow Down, Move Over law by passing bill A-3890 in 2020 that states if a driver is convicted of this offense three or more times in a single year, they will incur two motor vehicle points on their driver's license, which may result in additional penalties, including surcharges and license suspension; and

WHEREAS, there is a need in New Jersey to bring awareness to crash responder safety and the dangers of failing to abide by laws established to protect first responders and motorists at crash scenes;

WHEREAS, over 1,400 first responders have participated in Nevada Traffic Incident Management Coalition efforts throughout the state since 2014, and 71% of all first responders in Nevada have received Traffic Incident Management training; and
